International Day of Peace

Description

On November 30th 1981, the UN General Assembly, as per resolution 36/67, established the International Day of Peace. Initially, it took place on the third Tuesday of September of every year, the same day as the opening of the General Assembly sessions.

In 2001, via resolution 55/282, it was decided that the **International Day of Peace** would be celebrated every September 21st and the United Nations urged all countries to end hostilities and promote educational actions to raise awareness and promote peace.

<u>Living Peace International</u> proposes to all its members the active participation in this anniversary, an occasion to remember the importance of their commitment to peace building.

Target Audience

Children, youth and adults from schools, youth groups and youth associations.

Goals

- Reflect on the meaning of peace and ways to achieve it
- Reflect on the reasons for the existence of conflict and how to resolve it
- Developing the concept of universal brotherhood
- Promotion of bonds of trust and reciprocity
- Developing creativity for peace

Activities

Peace promotion activities can be created or customized Individually or in groups.

It is possible to celebrate this anniversary by participating in the activity also promoted by the Living Peace Project: Peace Crane, which involves the making of doves ("peace doves") through origami technique and their exchange with a school or group from a distant country, the "exchange partner".


